Interpretation:

I submit the Board's policy language has been comprehensively interpreted and data submitted to quantify the conclusion statements. Reports have been submitted and accepted by the Board of Education according to the regular schedule of monitoring reports.

Data Reported:

4.1.1 Northview student performance exceeds the performance of the KISD and the state of Michigan students in all M-STEP assessments.

Conclusion Statement:

It is unknown until the M-STEP scores are released by the state of Michigan (expected by August 2018) if the district met this expectation.

4.2.1 Digital curriculum documents (including curriculum maps) exist and are easily accessed by teachers, administrators, families and students.

Conclusion Statement:

The organization will meet this expectation by June 28, 2018. Curriculums for Math, English Language Arts, Science and Social Studies will be sent to the Board of Education on Friday, June 29, 2018.

4.2.3 95% of graduates earn an endorsed diploma based on criteria established by the Northview Board of Education and the state of Michigan within a four year period of time. At all times, the graduation rate of Northview students will exceed the state of Michigan graduation rate.

Conclusion Statement:

The organization met the expectation of 95% graduation rate for the class of 2018. Based on the most recent data, this also exceeds the state of Michigan graduation rate.
